

### **Unit Objectives:**

During this unit, we will:

- Identify and use literary terms such as theme, authorial voice, style, suspense, irony, and tone.
- Read and enjoy a shared text to establish a classroom culture of reading, sharing, and communicating independent ideas, claims, and opinions that are influenced by the shared text.
- Establish the form and function of literature circles.

### **Unit Overview:**

During this unit, we will introduce some major ideas (e.g. theme, writer's voice, motif, suspense, irony, et.al.) that will continue to be developed throughout the year. We will intentionally be working on a shared text, *Boy*, by Roald Dahl, to develop skills and strategies that will make sure that you will be able to do all of this independently later in the year when you are asked to do so.

Our hope is to do the majority of this work in class, but if you're absent or didn't finish your work in class you may need to make up some work. Therefore, the amount of homework you have is entirely up to the effort that you put into the classroom assignments.

#### **Book Club Procedure**

Before a book club, you must do some work to prepare for a good discussion. Obviously, to be fully prepared you need to have read up to the agreed-upon stopping point. It is okay to read ahead, but you can not discuss ahead because you might give spoilers to your groupmates. This preparation is the most important thing.
